UST when you're getting jaded with panto, along comes New Brighton's Cinderella to lift the spirits.

It's a show which, for a change, has had a little thought put into it rather than worm-out routines and lokes.

The gags are genuinely funny (although there's still some of the old ones in there), the story moves along at a cracking pace and there's even a spot of theatrical spectacle with lights, ponies and a glittering coach.

Above all, there is a cast which not only has energy but talent too, be it for comedy, singing or dance.

And in headliner Jonathon Morris playing Buttons it has all three. You read that correctly, Jonathon Morris, the bloke who played mild-mannered Adrian Boswell in Bread.

On stage he is a revelation, a highoctane comic who dances like a wild man and sings a pretty mean ballad as well. He never stops, whether it be acting the dunce, singing love ballads with Cinderella or getting into a dance routine with the Rita Proctor Teensteppers.

It's a clueless act which appeals both to the kiddles and to the grown-ups for whom he offers a couple of pieces of harmless innuendo.

Matching him in personality is Eithne Browne's evil Baroness, dressed all in

black, carrying a big stick and reving in the boos she not only solicits butellects in good measure.

Karl Lornie gives a local accent and sense of humour to Dandini while Liverpool's Joanne Birchall - one of TV: Pop Idol finalists - is an attractive Cinc-ella. Adian Bell and Michael James ve the Ugly Sisters zip and visual oomp

The dances are imaginativelychoreo graphed and - unlike some pantosais year - live musicians in the pit.
